Update from the Dean



The 2022/23 academic year has started! Welcome to the hundreds of new PGRs starting your research degrees here at York. You are starting something amazing and life changing. For those of you part-way through, you might have the 'mid-PhD blues' - that is quite normal and, for most of you, the fog will clear and suddenly your ideas will coalesce on the page. This is also a busy time of year for thesis submissions - so congratulations if you are in that happy (and relieved) group!

Even if I had space here, I don't think that I could adequately summarise the tumultuous events of the last few months. So, I am really pleased that YGRS is collaborating with colleagues and the GSA to provide extra funding to help York's PGRs to cope with the cost

of living crisis. In September, we announced that PGRs funded wholly or partly by the University and/or UKRI would receive a 10% increase in their stipends on top of previously announced increases. Last week, YGRS contacted self-funded PGRs within their registration period to offer them support to help them meet extra expenses. The University and both student unions are putting in place a range of measures open to all PGRs and students - see the Cost of Living hub for full details. And we should be making further announcements soon.

At the end of the month, I will be off on my first overseas trip since 2019 (our holiday to the Isle of Wight doesn't really count!). Hopefully, more of you will feel ready to travel to conferences and fieldwork this academic year. For those of you who are self-funded, YGRS has a <u>conference fund</u> to help with costs - see below.

Finally, October is Black History Month. YGRS is leading a consortium of universities dedicated to equity at doctoral level. Have a look at the <u>YCEDE pages</u> (more next month on this inspirational project) where we have collated a <u>list of BHM events</u> happening across Yorkshire universities. There is still much to celebrate and enjoy despite the many 'unprecedented' events happening around us.
